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Remarks/Market Observations:		<p>*Major Source Areas of Top 3 Commodities: 1. Bangus = Bulacan, Rizal, Zambales, Batangas, and Pangasinan 2. Tilapia = Batangas 3.1 Galunggong = Palawan 3.2 Imported Galunggong = China, Indonesia, and Vietnam</p> <p>Current Closed Fishing Season (CFS) Implementations: - November 1, 2019 to January 31, 2020: Local Galunggong in Northern Palawan, which is where 92% of the landed catch at the Navotas Fish Port and 22% of total landed catch nationwide are sourced (per JAO No. 01 series of 2015); and - November 15, 2019 to February 15, 2020: Sardines, Herrings (<i>Sardinella spp.</i>), and Mackerels (<i>Rastrilliger spp.</i>) in some parts of the Visayan Sea (per Fisheries Administrative Order No. 167-3 Series of 2013)</p> <p>Newly Implemented Closed Fishing Season: -December 1, 2019-March 1, 2020: Sardines in some parts of the Zamboanga Sea per BFAR Administrative Circular (BAC) 255, Series of 2014, begun this week. The ban includes species belonging to the Clupeidae family (i.e., <i>Sardinella lemuru</i>, <i>Sardilla fimbriata</i>, and <i>Sardinella gibbosa</i>).</p> <p>The following observations were gathered during the actual price monitoring activities for the month of December:</p> <p>*The supply of marine fishes remain low this month due to the low volume of catch. According to interviews, this may be due to the following: (1) the cold weather brought by Hanging Amihan, wherein marine fishes normally stay on the bottom of the ocean; (2) the lean season for some commodities; (3) the occurrence of full moon last December 12, wherein the bright moon light causes the marine fishes to scatter; (4) the heavy rains brought by typhoon "Tisoy" and "Ursula", which pressed some fisherfolk to halt their fishing operations; and (5) the aforementioned fishing bans in some major fishing grounds in the country.</p> <p>*No price data was gathered for local Galunggong "lalaki" (<i>Decapterus macrosoma</i>) during the actual price monitoring this month. According to the enumerators, the only available local Galunggong "lalaki" cannot be used as sample in price monitoring because they are not in good condition in terms of quality and appearance, and are being sold mixed with other marine species such as <i>Selar crumenophthalmus</i>, <i>Decapterus spp.</i>, and <i>Sardinella spp.</i></p> <p>*The low supply of marine fishes caused a higher demand for frozen/imported fishery commodities resulting to an increase in the number of broker/traders selling the said commodities. However, it was observed that there is still a low supply of frozen/imported Galunggong at the Navotas Fish Port, possibly contributing to its relatively higher price.</p> <p>*Majority of the available frozen/imported fishery commodities are Squid and Salmon Head.</p> <p>*The supply of frozen/imported fishery commodities has been relatively more adequate for the the last week of this month. This came as a result of the Bureau accepting applications and issuing permits to import marine fishes, including local Galunggong after the Department of Agriculture authorized BFAR to issue a Sanitary and Phytosanitary Import Clearance (SPSIC) and Certificate of Necessity to Import. Per brokers/traders, this is due to the low volume of supply and high farmgate price coming from major source areas (e.g., Batangas). It was also noted from interviews that some producers are extending their culture period in an effort to make the value of their Tilapia more "marketable."</p> <p>*As for Bangus, the price and supply of the commodity are stable. However, some brokers/traders opted to increase their selling price due to the expected increase in the demand brought by the nearing of Christmas holidays.</p> <p>*The higher demand for aquaculture commodities (e.g., Bangus and Tilapia), brought about by the low supply and high price of marine fishes, may have also contributed to the higher price of Bangus and Tilapia.</p>
