<b>Remarks/Market Observations:</b>			<p>The following observations were gathered during this month's price monitoring activities:</p> <p>Week 1:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Stable supply and price of Tilapia was observed at the Navotas Fish Port. However, wholesale price of Bangus increased due to the relatively larger sizes (2-3 pcs/kg) unloaded.</li> <li>Abundant supply of Local Galunggong other marine commodities were unloaded. However, selling price is relatively higher due to the good quality and even sizes of supplies. On June 6, no medium-sized Local Galunggong, and only large variants unloaded at the Navotas Fish Port.</li> <li>Imported galunggong were also being traded in large quantities. Supplies, however, are mostly brought to nearby provinces or are bought by processors for making smoked fish or "tinapa"</li> <li>Low influx of buyers remained to be observed in the monitored wholesale market.</li> <li>The Philippine Fisheries Development Authority (PFDA) continues the strict implementation of precautionary management measures at the Navotas Fish Port as stated in previous reports. Further, Navotas Fish Port (Markets 1 to 5) was closed from June 6 to 7 for regular cleaning and disinfection.</li> </ol>											

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<b>Remarks/Market Observations:</b>			<p>Week 2:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Price of Tilapia increased due to the higher demand. Similarly, Bangus had a price increment due to the lesser supplies brought by no availability from Laguna as well as the availability of mainly large variants.</li> <li>Low unloading of marine commodities from Palawan and Mindoro was observed on June 4 to 5 due to the occurrence of full moon on June 5, which hindered fishing operations of some vessels. Further, local galunggong unloaded were not of good quality in terms of freshness.</li> <li>Tulingan, Tamban, and other mixed fishery commodities were also unloaded at the Navotas Fish Port</li> <li>Frozen fishery commodities are also being traded in the port. However, these are sold at a lower price due to consumers' preference for local or fresh marine commodities.</li> <li>Due to very low influx of buyers at the Navotas Fish Port, some traders limited their supply for selling while some lowered their price by 20 to 50 percent in order to sell out all supplies. According to some vendors, the low demand is also attributable to the consumers' lack of financial resources amid the long duration of lockdown.</li> <li>The following preventive management measures for buyers and workers at Navotas Fish Port are continuously being implemented by the Philippine Fisheries Development Authority (PFDA):               <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Wearing of face mask, white shirt, and white rain boots;</li> <li>Showing of NFPC-issued ID card upon entry;</li> <li>Checking of temperature (thermal scanning);</li> <li>Washing of hands in the designated handwash area;</li> <li>Disinfection of boots in the three-stage footbath; and</li> <li>Strict maintaining of social distancing.</li> </ol> </li> </ol>																
			<p>Week 3:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Large quantities of Tilapia and Local Galunggong were observed at the Navotas Fish Port.</li> <li>Bangus, on the other hand, continue to be mostly large to jumbo in sizes sourced from Pangasinan.</li> <li>Dominant sources for the following fishery commodities:  <table border="0"> <tr> <td>Commodity</td> <td>Wholesale (Navotas Fish Port)</td> </tr> <tr> <td>Bangus</td> <td>Bulacan, Pangasinan</td> </tr> <tr> <td>Tilapia</td> <td>Batangas</td> </tr> <tr> <td>Local Galunggong</td> <td>Palawan</td> </tr> </table> </li> <li>On June 16, wide variety of marine commodities including Tulingan, Dalagang Bukid, and Isdang Bato were unloaded at the fish port. On June 19, abundant quantities of Galunggong Lalaki &amp; Babae, Lapu-lapu, Maya-maya, Isdang Bato, Tulingan, Tamban, Pusit, Gulyasan, and Yellowfin Tuna from Mindoro and Palawan were unloaded at the fish port.</li> <li>Precautionary management measures against COVID-19 are continuously being implemented by the Philippine Fisheries Development Authority (PFDA) at the Navotas Fish Port.</li> </ol>									Commodity	Wholesale (Navotas Fish Port)	Bangus	Bulacan, Pangasinan	Tilapia	Batangas	Local Galunggong	Palawan
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<p>Week 4:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Tilapia and marine commodities including Local Galunggong are sold at relatively lower prices due to the large volume of unloading at the Navotas Fish Port.</li> <li>Bangus, however, is sold at a relatively higher price due to the unloaded being large variants from Pangasinan.</li> <li>Frozen commodities are still being traded at the Navotas Fish Port. However, prices decreased due to the low demand alongside the large volume of fresh commodities, which is most preferred by the buyers/consumers.</li> <li>The Philippine Fisheries Development Authority (PFDA) continues the strict implementation of preventive management measures amid the increasing COVID-19 cases.</li> </ol>
