**REMARKS AND OBSERVATIONS**

**Week 1: May 1-4, 2020**

Price of bangus increased by Php10.00/kg to Php15.00/kg, depending on the landed volume.  
In Abra and Ifugao, only top three (bangus, tilapia and Galunggong) fishery commodities are available.  
Lower demand for fishery commodities due to implementation of market window hours in the different barangays covering the three monitored markets.  
In Baguio City Wet Market, there is enough supply of fishery commodities to meet the demands of the community.  
Most of the available fishery commodities are sourced from Dagupan, Pangasinan and Agoo, La Union due to the strict implementation of Enhanced Community Quarantine in Luzon.

**Week 5: May 26-30, 2020**

Only Bangus, Tilapia, and Galunggong are available in the monitored markets in Abra and Ifugao. The lesser availability of commodities resulted from the implementation of market window hours in different barangays.  
Enough supplies of fishery commodity are available in Baguio City to meet the current demand of the community.  
Most fishery commodities are sourced from Dagupan, Pangasinan and Agoo, La Union.

In Naval Market, lesser commodities are available as there are lesser buyers and vendors present in the market as a result of the dry run of the LGU's mobile palengke program. Catbalogan LGU has implemented various safety measures for the consumers and vendors of Catbalogan City (e.g. wearing of mask, social distancing, and monitoring of prices of basic and prime commodities). Markets were also closed for 3 days for disinfection. In Catarman Market, the prices and supply of fishery commodities remain stable.

**Week 2: May 1-4, 2020**

Tilapia is not available in all the monitored markets. In Tacloban Public Market, there is sufficient supply of commodities. Social distancing is strictly implemented and disinfection stations are located at the entrance and exit points. In Ormoc Public Market, there is low supplies due to low volume of catch. In Naval Public Market, there is lesser supplies of fishery commodities as well as number of buyers as a result of the Mobile Palengke Program of LGU Naval which sells dried and fresh fishery products, meat, vegetables medicine, rice, and other commodities are sold at various barangays. In Maasin Public Market, some fish stalls have no display and there is limited variety of fishes available. In Guiuan Public Market, a holding area was installed at the entrance of the market in order to limit the number of customers. Sanitizer are also located at the entrance and exit points. In Catarman Public Market, there remains sufficient supplies of fishery commodities in the markets, except Tilapia which has limited supplies. In Catbalogan Public Market, various safety measure have been implemented at the Catbalogan City (i.e., wearing of mask, social distancing). Some stalls also decided not to sell due to low influx of buyers.

**Week 3: May 12-18, 2020**

Supplies of fishery commodities decreased due to hampered fishing operations last week due to observance of Holy Week. Galunggong is in abundant in the monitored markets due to its peak season. Tilapia supplies is starting to increase in the monitored markets. In Ormoc City, only small volume of fishery commodities was unloaded at the bagsakan center/trading post, resulting to lesser supplies at the retail level. In Maasin City, low supplies of fishery commodities are observed and only three (3) stalls have bangus. LGU has fully enforced the price cap for fishery commodities to ensure that prices remain stable. In Catarman City, there is an abundance of sardines (about 500kgs). In Catbalogan, LGU is calling for a stricter implementation of COVID-19 measures such as social/physical distancing, no face mask no entry, no quarantine passes no entry. Shoppers are also advised to purchase essential goods once a day only. Markets are closed on Sundays for disinfection.

**Week 4: May 19-25, 2020**

There continues to be unstable supply of Tilapia in all markets. In Tacloban Public Market, Catbalogan Public Market and Naval Public Market, price of Galunggong is in a fluctuating trend. In Maasin Public Market, only Bangus was available among the top 3 commodities. Other marine commodities such as Skipjack and Tulingan are in sufficient supplies. In Catarman Public Market, there is limited supplies of tilapia. High-value marine fishery commodities are being sold at a higher price this week.

**Week 5: May 26-30, 2020**

In Ormoc Public Market, price of Bangus had a notable price decrease. In Naval Public Market, prices of fishery commodities vary depending on the freshness of fish. In Maasin Public Market, abundant supply of Skipjack and Yellowfin Tuna are observed from Negros. Other species are supplied from neighboring towns (i.e., Bato, Macrohon, and Maasin). In Guiuan Public Market, there are no available Tilapia since the beginning of the year. However, other commodities are abundant in supply. In Catarman, social/physical distancing measures are strictly enforced in the public markets. Vendors are also instructed to maintain one (1) stall equidistant to each other. In Catbalogan Public Market, there is an apparent increase in the prices of fishery commodities due to the lesser variety of fish species sold in the market.

In Davao de Oro, Tagum Public Market is temporarily closed causing its vendors and stall holders to sell their commodities through meet ups in the boundary of Tagum and Mawab Davao de Oro. Most fish supplies are now being sourced from Mangagoy, causing additional transport cost and labor. This resulted to higher prices of fish commodities in the markets.

In Davao Oriental, the supply of fishery commodities remain sufficient. Prices are also low due to the low influx of people in the market.

**Week 4: May 19-25, 2020**

In Davao del Norte, City Economic Enterprise Office are continuing to monitor the prices of fishery commodities. Prices of Tamban is relatively low due to abundant supply.

In Davao de Oro and Davao Oriental, prices of commodities are lower due to the low influx of people in the markets. Despite this, there continues to be sufficient supplies.

In Davao del Sur, unloaded commodities have varying sizes and volume.

**Week 5: May 26-30, 2020**

Prices of fishery commodities are noticeably low due to bad weather condition and limited number of market goers.

**Week 1: May 1-4, 2020**

In Surigao City Public Market, Mangagoy Public Market, Tandang City Public Market, and Dapa Public Market, there is stable supply and price of commodities. However, only few market goers are observed.

In Langihan Public Market, fish displays have decreased to 1-2 boxes per day from the usual 5-6 boxes due to the lesser demand observed in the markets. Price, however, remain stable.

Transport of fishery products are continuous; however, operation for peddlers (habal-habal) selling fish have stopped as they are unable to secure food passes.

In San Francisco Public Market, entry of public is strictly monitored by LGUs through the observance of single entry point and 3 exit ways. Volume and prices of fishery commodities remain stable.

In San Jose Public Market, supply is lower as small fisherfolk opt to not sell their fishery commodities and keep them for personal consumption instead.

**Week 2: May 1-4, 2020**

In Surigao City Public Market, there is enough volume of fishery commodities. However, only few market goers are observed in the markets.

In Dapa Public Market, there is enough volume of fishery commodities. Prices are also stable.

In Langihan Public Market, fish displays decreased to 1-2 boxes per day from the usual 5-6 boxes due to the lesser number of buyers in the market.

In Mangagoy Public Market and Tandag City Public Market, there continues to be stable price and supply of commodities. There are still low influx of buyers due to community quarantine imposed in the city.

In San Francisco Public Market, market operations remain stable. Entry of consumers are being controlled and new entry and exit points have been implemented. Volume and prices of fishery commodities remain the same.

In San Jose Public Market, small-scale fisherfolk decided to not sell their fish supply and keep them instead for public consumption.

**Week 3: May 12-18, 2020**

In Surigao City Public Market and Langihan Public Market, fishery commodities are sold at a lower price due to the low influx of marketgoers. Marine supplies are mostly from the Fish Landing Center in Surigao City, while the aquacultured commodities are from Brgy. Nabago, Surigao City

In San Jose Public Market, prices of fishery commodities vary with the freshness and sizes.

**Week 4: May 19-25, 2020**

In Surigao City, Baslig City, Surigao del Sur, and Surigao del Norte, there continues to be enough volume of fishery commodities. However, only few market goers are observed in the markets.

In Agusan del Norte, fish displays decreased to 1-2 boxes per day from the usual 5-6 boxes due to the lesser number of buyers in the market.

In Agusan del Sur, the LGU is controlling the entry of consumers and set up new entry and exit points amid the issue on COVID-19.

In Province of Dinagat Islands, small-scale fisherfolk decided to not sell their fish supply and keep them instead for public consumption.

**NCR**

**Week 1: May 1-4, 2020**

The following observations were gathered during the actual price monitoring activities this week (March 30 to April 3, 2020):

\*There is an abundance of marine commodities such as Local Galunggong (Decapterus spp.), Dalagang Bukid Bilog, Tulingan, Salay-ginto, Matambaka, Tahong and Pusit Kalawang in the monitored retail wet markets.

\*Majority of the available Galunggong Babae are small-sized, while Galunggong lalaki are small to medium-sized.

\*More markets have Imported Galunggong but only Balintawak Market has medium-sized while Quinta, Mega-Q, and Farmers have large-sized. The absence of the commodity in the remaining monitored markets may still be due to the abundance of its local variant, which is more preferred by consumers.

\*Major source areas for Bangus and Tilapia are Bulacan and Pampanga, respectively. Only a few markets have supply of Tilapia Batangas and Bangus Pangasinan .

\*Some fish stalls in the monitored markets remain closed due to:

(a) Lower demand caused by lesser buyers at the market, (b) Fear of acquiring COVID-19;

\*The following markets have implemented precautionary management measures to avoid COVID-19:

(a) Kamuning Market - "No ID, No Entry Policy", (b) Quinta Market - "One Entry, One Exit" and "No Mask, No Entry" Policies; and maximum of 20 buyers inside the market during peak hours. Market admin also imposed shift in trading hours to 7:00AM to 7:00PM from 5:00AM to 8:00PM, but in actual monitoring, trading hours still start as early as 5:00AM, (c) Munoz Market - "One Entry, One Exit" and "No Mask, No Entry" Policies; and shift in trading hours to 6:00AM to 6:00PM from previous schedule of 6:00AM to 8:00PM, (d) Tandang Sora Market - under Extreme Community Quarantine in Bgy. Tandang Sora; and "One Entry, One Exit Policy", (e) Galas Market - maximum of 6-7 buyers inside the market at a time, (f) Balintawak Market - "No Mask, No Entry Policy" and shift in trading hours to 3:00AM to 6:00PM from 24-hour operation, (g) Commonwealth Market - shift in market hours to 4:00AM to 6:00PM from 2:00AM to 10:00PM, (h) Navotas Fish Port - "No ID, No Entry Policy"; restriction of ID issuance; and shift in trading hours to 4:00PM to 1:00AM from 7:00PM to 3:00AM

\*Balintawak Market continues to have a large number of buyers and vendors despite of the situation of COVID-19. Other markets still have very low influx of buyers.

\*Some fish vendors from the following markets are selling their supply of Bangus and Tilapia above the maximum allowable limit of the set SRP due to price mark-up caused by sourcing their supply in nearby retail markets (i.e. Farmers):

- Bangus – Kamuning, Galas, Tandang Sora

- Tilapia – Kamuning

\*Trabajo Market has resumed its operations. However, only three (3) fish stalls were open and very minimal buyers were observed.

\*In Munoz and Tandang Sora Markets, only the wet area (fish, meat, and vegetable section) is open.

**Week 2: May 1-4, 2020**

1. In view of the Lenten Season (Holy Week), major observations were recorded below:

a. High influx of buyers were observed in Commonwealth, Tandang Sora, Quinta, Trabajo, Mega-Q, Kamuning and Balintawak Markets to buy fresh fish commodities;

b. Prices of fishery commodities at the Navotas Fish Port (retail) increased; and

c. The following markets will be closed in observance of the Holy Week:

(a) Tandang Sora & Mega-Q Market - April 9-10, 2020

(b) Quinta & Trabajo Market - April 10, 2020

2. Large volumes of small-sized local Galunggong Babae (Decapterus russelli) were observed in the monitored markets. Meanwhile, majority of the observed local Galunggong Lalaki are small to medium-sized.

3. Lesser volumes of selected marine commodities were observed in the monitored markets as a result of the occurrence of full moon or "Pink Moon" on April.

4. Only Balintawak and Farmers Markets have medium-sized imported Galunggong, while Muñoz has large-sized. The other remaining markets have no supply of the commodity, which may be attributed to the availability of its local variant.

5. Sufficient volumes of Bangus and Tilapia are available in the markets, with majority of Tilapia supply coming from Pampanga.

6. Some fish stalls in the monitored markets remain closed in fear of acquiring COVID-19.

7. The wide disparity between the wholesale and retail price of local galunggong may be due to any of the following reasons:

a. Not all fish retailers are sourcing from Navotas Fish Port.

b. Smaller markets, such as Kamuning and Galas Markets, are usually getting their fish supplies from neighboring bigger retail markets like Farmers, Mega-Q, and Commonwealth Markets.

c. Some markets and vendors are acquiring directly from producers and fish traders/ viajeros coming from other source areas (Quezon, Bulacan, and Pampanga).

d. Some vendors are buying fish on a credit basis, which commands a higher price of commodities than those who buy on a cash basis.

8. Some of the challenges in getting accurate price data and market observations during monitoring is the non-transparency and unwillingness of vendors to provide accurate and comprehensive market data and information. It is also possible that relevant market information (e.g., source area and pass-on price) from the first or previous layer of market structure is unknown to vendor being interviewed during m

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9. However, some fish vendors from the specified markets below were observed to be selling their supply of Bangus and Tilapia above the maximum allowable limit of the set SRP due to price mark-up caused by sourcing their supply in nearby retail markets (i.e. Farmers): • Bangus – Kamuning, Galas, Tandang Sora • Tilapia – Kamuning

10. Same precautionary management measures stated in the report dated 3 April 2020 (below) are being implemented in the monitored markets.

- (a) Kamuning Market - "No ID, No Entry Policy"; After just two days of implementation, the barangay removed the policy on the maximum number of buyers entering the market at time, in fear that no buyers will come to Kamuning Market at all.
- (b) Quinta Market - "One Entry, One Exit Policy"; "No Mask, No Entry Policy"; Maximum of 20 buyers inside the market during peak hours; Market admin also imposed shift in trading hours from 7:00AM to 7:00PM from 5:00AM to 8:00PM, but in actual monitoring, trading hours still start as early as 5:00AM.
- (c) Munoz Market - "One Entry, One Exit Policy"; "No Mask, No Entry Policy"; Established number of buyers in the market at a time, depending on the influx of buyers; Shift in trading hours to 6:00AM to 6:00PM from previous schedule of 6:00AM to 8:00PM.
- (d) Tandang Sora Market - "One Entry, One Exit Policy"; Under Extreme Community Quarantine in Barangay Tandang Sora
- (e) Galas Market - Maximum of 6-7 buyers inside the market at a time.
- (f) Balintawak Market - "No Mask, No Entry Policy"; Shift in trading hours to 3:00AM to 6:00PM from 24-hour operation
- (g) Commonwealth Market - Shift in trading hours to 4:00AM to 6:00PM from 2:00AM to 10:00PM
- (f) Navotas Fish Port - "No Entry, No ID Policy"; Restriction of ID Issuance; Shift in trading hours to 4:00PM to 1:00AM from 7:00PM to 3:00AM
- (g) Trabajo Market - resumption of market operations

**Week 3: May 12-18, 2020**

The following observations were gathered during the actual price monitoring activities this week (April 13-17, 2020):

- \*Low volume of unloading at the Navotas and Malabon Fish Ports at the first part of the week, causing vendors from Commonwealth, Farmers, Mega-Q, and Munoz to directly source their fish supplies from major source areas such as Quezon Province. Marine commodities, including Galunggong, sourced from Quezon are being sold at a higher price due to the logistic costs and its better quality in terms of freshness:
- \*Limited supplies of all marine commodities, except for small-sized Galunggong Babae (Decapterus russelli), which is abundant in the monitored markets. Majority of the available Galunggong Lalaki are medium to large-sized.
- \*Medium-sized imported galunggong is available only at the Mega-Q and Farmers Markets, while only large-sized imported galunggong was observed at the Quinta Market.
- \*Sufficient supply of Bangus and Tilapia in the monitored markets--with majority of the Tilapia sourced from Pampanga & Batangas, and Bangus from Pangasinan & Bulacan. Majority of the available Bangus Pangasinan are large-sized.
- \*Commonwealth, Tandang Sora, Mega-Q and Munoz Markets continue to have high influx of people. Farmers Market was observed to have higher foot traffic today as compared to the usual, causing buyers to not observe the social distancing policy. Other remaining markets still have low number of buyers.
- \*In addition to implementing precautionary management measures as stated in the 3 and 14 April 2020 reports, the following updates were noted from the monitored markets:
  - a. Commonwealth Market – Non-observance of social distancing policy. Limitation of buyers entering the markets have also caused low sales for vendors.
  - b. Farmers - market administrators are securing observance of physical distancing in the market.
  - c. Quinta - trading hours has shifted to 6:00AM to 5:00PM from 7:00AM to 7:00PM
  - d. Galas - no trading operations beginning April 20 due to the low number vendors opening their stalls and low influx of consumers.
  - e. Kamuning Market – Implementation of new trading schedule effective 9 April 2020 (i.e., Mondays – closed for disinfection; Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays – market schedule for Kamuning residents; Fridays and Sundays – market schedule for non-Kamuning residents)
  - f. Navotas Fish Port (Retail) – Lesser vendors are selling in the market due to the low demand caused by lower number of buyers
  - g. Other precautionary management measures can be referred to from reports dated 3 & 14 April 2020.
- \*Price of Bangus were found to be above the maximum allowable limit of the set SRP in the Kamuning, Galas and Tandang Sora Markets.
- \*In Navotas Fish Port, traders are having a hard time selling their fishes due to low number of buyers. Low availability of fishery commodities available at the fish port due to the hampered transportation caused by the Batangas Port lockdown.
- \*Generally the supply of local galunggong, bangus, and tilapia is sufficient due to its availability from the major sources compared to last monitoring on April 14.

**Week 4: May 19-25, 2020**

April 21, 2020:

- 1. Commonwealth Market administration has exempted stall holders and vendors from daily rent payments to encourage vendors who decided or plan to close or not sell fishery commodities during the time of the COVID-19 crisis.
- 2. Sufficient supplies of fishery commodities, especially bangus, tilapia, matambaka, tulingan, dalagang bukid, alumahan, and galunggong lalaki, burot, and balsa at the monitored markets.
- 3. Imported galunggong is available only at the Farmers Market. The limited supply of the commodity may be attributed to:
  - a. low demand caused by consumers' preference of local galunggong over imported galunggong; and
  - b. abundance of local galunggong at major sources (i.e., Navotas Fish Port) due to the larger volumes of catch.
- 2. As observed at the Farmers, Mega-Q, and Commonwealth Markets, marine fishes sourced directly from Quezon Province have better quality compared to those from Navotas and Malabon.
- 3. All markets, except Farmers Market, have low influx of buyers or "matumal ng bentahan" which caused some vendors to:
  - a. reduce the volume of fishery commodities for selling; or
  - b. not open their fish stalls
- 4. In addition to the precautionary measures stated in the April 3, 14 and 17 reports, the following updates on market schedules are noted from the monitored markets:
  - a. Kamuning Market - effective April 21, 2020:
    - Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday & Sunday (marketing schedule for Brgy. Kamuning Residents)
    - Monday, Wednesday & Friday (No restrictions)
  - b. Munoz market - below are the market schedule as per Barangay Resolution No. 39 S.2020 effective April 22, 2020:
    - Monday, Wednesday & Friday-5:00 AM to 12:00 NN (Residents of Brgy. Veterans Village, Bungad, Paltok & Katipunan); 1:00 PM to 6:00 PM (Residents of Bahay Toro, Del Monte, Apolonio Samson & other brgy.s.)
    - Tuesday & Thursday - 5:00 AM to 12:00 NN (Residents of Brgy. Veterans Village, San Antonio, Ramon Magsaysay and Alicia); 1:00 PM to 6:00 PM (Phil-am, West Triangle, Pag-asa & Sto. Cristo)
    - Sunday - No restrictions
  - c. Galas Market - No lockdown implemented per PM report dated April 17, 2020. The current market schedule are as follows:
    - 6:00 Am to 9:00 AM (Residents of Brgy. San Isidro, Sto. Nino & Santol); 9:00 AM to 12:00 AM (Residents of Brgy. Dona Imelda & Don Manuel); 11:00 AM - 4:00 AM (residents from Metro Manila); 11:00 AM- 3:00 PM (All Sari-sari stores are closed)

April 24, 2020:

- 1. Sufficient volumes of galunggong variants (lalaki, babae, burot, and balsa), bangus, tilapia, tulingan, matambaka, and dalagang bukid were observed in the monitored markets. However, only small volumes of lapu-lapu and maya-maya are available today.
- 2. Majority of local galunggong at the retail level are sourced directly from Lucena, Quezon, where the commodity is sold at a higher price due to its better quality as compared to those unloaded at the Navotas and Malabon Fish Ports.
- 3. No medium-sized imported galunggong were observed at the monitored retail markets as vendors' prefer to sell local galunggong due to its lower wholesale price and higher demand among consumers. However, large-sized imported galunggong was observed at Quinta Market only.
- 4. The bulk of tilapia supply at the Navotas Fish Port (wholesale) are still from Batangas and notably tilapia from Batangas were observed in majority of the monitored wet markets unlike in the past days.
- 5. The following observations were noted at Navotas Fish Port:
  - a. More supply of medium-sized (3-5 pcs) bangus from Pangasinan were sold at lower price
  - b. Large volumes of small to large-sized local galunggong were unloaded;
  - c. Local galunggong is in demand causing higher price for the medium-sized commodity
  - d. Imported fishery commodities are still being sold in the market.
- 6. Kamuning Market has high foot traffic today (Friday) as buyers are allowed in the market every Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Other remaining monitored retail markets have low influx of buyers causing:
  - a. low sales for vendors (i.e., matumal ang bentahan),
  - b. lower selling price of commodities; and
  - c. some vendors not to open for the duration of the ECQ.
- 7. Mega-Q Mart has restricted its retail market window with the following schedule:
- 8. Trabajo Market is closed and will resume operations on April 26 after Sampaloc, Metro Manila has been placed on "hard lockdown" for 48 hours from April 23 to April 25 (8:00PM). As for Balintawak Market, there are still no updates on the resumption of its retail operations.
- 9. Some vendors in the following markets were found to be selling fresh fish commodities above the maximum allowable limit of the set SRP. Markets where prices of the commodity are higher than the allowable limit of SRP: Bangus (Kamuning, Galas and Tandang Sora); Tilapia (Kamuning and Quinta)
- 10. All monitored markets continue to implement various precautionary management and safety measures to control the spread of COVID-19.

Note: For Balintawak Market

- Retail operations have been suspended effective 11 April 2020 per Quezon City directive to strictly follow social distancing requirements in the market. This drastic directive came after the Holy Week as buyers flocked to the market (particularly on April 11 and 12) to buy fresh food supplies, wherein social distancing was not strictly observed
- Only wholesale and drop-off operations are allowed

**Week 5: May 26-30, 2020**

The following observations were gathered during the actual price monitoring activities this week (April 27 to May 1, 2020):

\*Generally, there is sufficient supplies of bangus, tilapia, and local and imported galunggong as well as tulingan, dalagang bukid bilog, matambaka, and alumahan available at the monitored markets. However, most of the available fish supplies are of low quality and/or remains from yesterday, causing a decrease among some commodities in the monitored markets.

\*Supply of local Galunggong available at the monitored retail markets that are being sold at higher prices (Php250.00/kg - Php260.00/kg) came from Lucena, Quezon Province. Prices are high due to their better quality.

\*Only Farmers Market has supply of imported galunggong on April 28. Only large-sized are available at the Quinta Market.

\*The bangus and tilapia supply at the monitored markets are mostly from Bulacan and Pampanga, respectively.

\*The following observations were gathered at the Navotas Fish Port (wholesale):

a. Large volumes of frozen galunggong and small-sized galunggong (Decapterus spp.) were unloaded; and

b. Majority of the bangus supply are still at 2-3 pcs/kg

\*Some vendors opted to lower their volume of fishery commodities for selling or not to open their stalls due the low influx of buyers in the markets.

\*Based on the price monitoring activities, the following markets were observed to have vendors selling their bangus and tilapia above the maximum allowable limit of the set Suggested Retail Prices (SRP):

a. Bangus -Tandang Sora

b. Tilapia - Quinta

\*The Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) inspected Kamuning, Galas, and Mega-Q Markets on the vendors' compliance to the Suggested Retail Prices for local and imported galunggong. Vendors who were found to be non-compliant presented receipts from wholesalers and explained that their selling prices are dependent on the wholesale price ("hango").

\*Munoz Market has restricted its market window schedule on Sundays to residents of Barangay Veterans Village, Bungad, Katipunan, & San Antonio.

**General Observation**

The disparity in the prices of the top fifteen (15) and other commodities is attributable to the species' size, quality, volume of supply, source area, as well as to the weather condition.
