REMARKS AND OBSERVATIONS

CAR

Week 1 (September 1-5)
There is a low supply of local Galunggong in Baguio City for the whole week. Other commodities continue to have sufficient supplies, coming from nearby regions (i.e., NCR and Visayas).

Week 2 (September 6-12)
Low supply of Bangus was recorded this week due to unavailability of supply from the nearby region due to lockdown from Dagupan.
Price of Local Galunggong varies depending on the species, source area, and volume of shipment.

Week 3 (September 13-19)
Low supply of Local Galunggong was recorded this week due to the unavailability of supply from nearby source areas relative to implementation of localized lockdowns.

General Observations:
More buyers were observed this month as market days and hours have been extended to three (3) days a week and four (4) hours a day.
In Abra and Ifugao, only top three fishery commodities (Bangus, Tilapia and Galunggong) are mostly available.
In Ifugao, border-to-border transactions for the shipment and delivery of fishery commodities entering the market are still in place in efforts to avoid further spread of COVID-19.
Supply of fish commodities in CAR remain sufficient coming mainly from nearby regions such as Dagupan, Pangasinan, Agoo, La Union, and Navotas Fish Port.

Week 1 (September 1-5)
In Bolinao Public Market (Pangasinan), no significant changes in prices and supply of most fishery commodities in the market. Supplies of most commodities were caught within the locality, except for Tilapia, which was sourced from Alaminos City, Pangasinan.
In Vigan City Public Market (Ilocos Sur), most fishery commodities available were from Dagupan City, Pangasinan.
In City of San Fernando Public Market (La Union), fish catch mostly come from Dagupan City, Pangasinan and Aringay, La Union.
About 90% of fish stalls in the market are now operational and the schedule of residents to enter the market is still based on their HQPs.

Week 2 (September 6-12)
In Urdaneta City Public Market (Pangasinan), Bolinao Public Market (Pangasinan), and Vigan City Public Market (Ilocos Sur), "No Mask, No Entry Policy" is implemented. No significant changes were recorded in the prices of fishery commodities and all fish stalls in the market are now operational.
Local Galunggong sold in the market are locally caught by fishermen in Damortis Sto. Tomas, La Union. Not all fish stalls are open since only few vendors were allowed to sell in the market.
