Remarks/Market Observations:

The following observations were gathered from market personnel and vendors for the month of June:

- Overall, sufficient supply of fresh marine commodities were observed at Navotas Fish Port (wholesale) throughout the 1st to 4th week of the month. Among the fishery commodities recorded were gulyasan, tulingan, matambaka, pusit, lapad, balsa, burot, tamban, babae, bilog, espada, betilya, and others. Limited supplies were then observed during the 5th week due to the rainy weather condition brought by Tropical Depression "Caloy" and "Domeng".
- Supply of medium-sized local-fresh galunggong (*Decapterus macrosoma*) remained stable due to the adequate unloadings at the Fish Port sourced mainly from Northern and Southern Palawan. Lesser supply were observed during the last week as a result from the inclement weather. The price difference may be attributed to the volatile catch and unloading of the said commodity per day. Other local-fresh variants (i.e., balsa, burot, babae) were also available at the fish port this month.
- Unloadings of imported-frozen galunggong "lalaki" (*Decapterus macrosoma*) decreased this month due to the sufficient supply of its local variant. This resulted to a stable prevailing wholesale price of Php120.00/kg during 1st to 4th week. The price then decreased as more supplies were observed at Navotas Fish Port as a substitute commodity for local-fresh galunggong.
- No unloadings of medium-sized alumahan were recorded at Navotas Fish Port this month.
- The prevailing wholesale price of bangus remained stable this month due to the stable demand and sufficient supply at the fish port. Prices vary depending on the source area, size, and quality (in terms of freshness) of the commodity. Price of bangus sourced from Dagupan are higher than supply sourced from Bulacan.
- For tilapia, stable prevailing wholesale price of Php90.00/kg was recorded this month as the supply for the said commodity continued to be sufficient.
- Top fishery commodities at Navotas Fish Port (wholesale) are sourced mainly from the following areas:
 - Bangus - Bulacan, Pangasinan
 - Tilapia - Batangas
 - Local-fresh galunggong - Quezon Province, Visayan Sea, Cuyo Pass, Northern & Southern Palawan
 - Imported-frozen Galunggong - China and Vietnam
- Precautionary measures (e.g., wearing of face mask and face shields as well as white boots and shirts, mandatory temperature checks, and regularly scheduled cleaning and disinfection) were continuously implemented by the Philippine Fisheries Development Authority (PFDA) at Navotas Fish Port Complex to safeguard vendors and buyers against COVID-19.
