WEEK 1-October 31-November 4, 2022 - WEEK 5-November 28-December 2, 2022																					
Fishery commodities were sourced from other regions. Only a few from the locality.																					
Some fish vendors sold their products at their respective communities/barangay. Other, unsold fish products in the public market were brought to their homes and sold online (by collecting orders), and delivered to consumers.																					
Total volume of fishery commodities was based on actual market monitoring only.																					
Set fixed prices for fishery commodities. Prices may fluctuate depending on the seasonality of fish species and on special occasions/holidays.																					
Limited number of species/commodities are found in the two (2) provinces; Kalinga and Mountain Province.																					
Marine fishery commodities were minimal due to bad weather.																					
Prices may fluctuate depending on the volume of stocks/supply and the number of consumers (supply-demand).																					
Lastly, CAR is a landlocked Region, the provinces rely only on a shipment coming from the nearby coastal regions. Therefore, fish commodities present and available in the three (3) major and four (4) additional markets depend on delivery. Probably we usually record low volume of fishery commodities in the markets. You may notice some of the fishery commodities have a fixed price.

WEEK 1-October 31-November 4, 2022 - WEEK 5-November 28-December 2, 2022																					
Source of most fishery commodities in Laoag City Public Market and Vigan City Public Market were from Dagupan City, Pangasinan.																					
Frozen galunggong was observed in the identified wet markets of La Union and Pangasinan with price ranging from Php100.00/kg to Php240.00/kg.																					
Difference in the recorded price may be attributed to the varying sizes of available supplies.

WEEK 1-October 31-November 4, 2022 - WEEK 5-November 28-December 2, 2022																					
Don Domingo Public Market: Hito and tilapia are the only live commodities sold in the market. Most of the commodities sold were from Manila and frozen. Increased prices in pompano due to limited supply. Shrimp's local supply was limited due to the damages caused by the typhoon "Paeng".																					
Solano Public Market: The fish supply in the market was sufficient and prices were stable. They sold fresh, chilled and frozen fish in the market.																					
Diffun Public Market: Vendors sell limited varieties of fish and other fishery products due to minimal demand. People could no longer afford high value species due to very high price hence they prefer tilapia and other affordable commodities.																					
Santiago City Public Market: Fishery products were sold fresh, chilled and frozen with sufficient ice to maintain their freshness and for the safety of the consumers. There were many fish vendors in the market and strict health protocols are being implemented.

However, prices of some marine commodities were high due to the occurrence of full moon and the increased cost of feeds for tilapia and bangus as well as increasing cost of gasoline/ diesel and trucking.

Presence of imported-frozen galunggong from China were also noted this week.																					
WEEK 2-November 7-11, 2022 - WEEK 5-November 28-December 2, 2022																					
Sufficient quantities of fishery commodities were observed in Catanduanes.																					
In fact, abundant supply of tilapia, blue-swimming crab, and shrimp were noted this week.																					
Presence of imported fishery commodities such as galunggong (round-scad) and buraw (Indian mackerel) were derived from China.																					
Green mussels were also available in the market during the monitoring (with LTP).																					
Lastly, other commodities observed were pangasius/creamdory, bighead carp, shrimps, Indian halibut, rainbow runner, red-tail scad, fork-tailed threadfin bream, pickhandle barracuda, silver pompret, tigertooth croaker, Indian anchovy, buccaneer anchovy, mantis shrimp, common silver-biddy, red snapper, oriental sillago, goldband goatfish, sulphur goatfish and others.

The Following are the observations during the implemenation of Price Monitoring in selected markets in Region VI.																					
1. Abundant Supply of Fishery Commodities in Kalibo Public Market; The Price increased for fishery commodity due to the effect of typhoon Paeng.																					
2. There is a sufficient supply of fish in the market. Eventhough the coastal water of Roxas City is still positive in Red Tide the prices of fishes in the market remain stable.																					
3. It was observed that abundant supply of Fishery commodities displayed in the market of Guimaras and the price remain stable.																					
4. It was observed that limited supply of fishery commodities in the market of Iloilo and the price slightly increased due to the effect of typhoon Paeng.																					
5. it was observed that the price of fishery commodities in the market of Negros Occidental, was slightly increased due to the bad weather condition.																					
WEEK 3-November 14-18, 2022																					
Minimal supplies of fishery commodities were observed in Kalibo Public Market which may be affected by the Northeast Monsoon (Amihan) and the occurrence of full moon on 8 November 2022. Lot of consumers were noted during the conduct of physical price monitoring.																					
Meanwhile, at Antique, abundant supplies of fishery commodities were observed in the market. More specifically, supplies of bangus, tilapia, and pasayan were reportedly derived from Hamtic, Antique, and Iloilo City.																					
At Capiz, sufficient supplies of fish were noted in the monitored market eventhough the coastal water of Roxas City is still positive in Red Tide and implementation of Closed Season the prices of fishes in the market remained stable.																					
Limited displays of fishery commodities were observed in Guimaras which may be due to the Closed Fishing Season (CFS) in Visayan Sea and the occurrence of fullmoon.																					
Stable price of fishery commodities were noted in Negros Occidental this week.																					
WEEK 4-November 21-25, 2022																					
Due to Northeast Monsoon (Amihan), minimal but sufficient supplies of fishery commodities were observed in Kalibo Public Market this week. In fact, there was increased in the prices of some marine fishery commodities. Moreover, lot of consumers were observed during the conduct of price monitoring.																					
Despite the occurrence of Red Tide in the coastal water of Roxas City and Closed Fishing Seasons, sufficient supplies of fishery commodities were observed in the market of Capiz. Consequently, prices remained stable.																					
Prices of fishery commodities in the market of Guimaras have slight increment due to the limited supply of fish and fishery products.																					
Stable prices of fishery commodities were noted in the market of Negros Occidental.																					
WEEK 5-November 28-December 2, 2022																					
Despite the effect of Northeast Monsoon (Amihan), abundant supplies of fishery commodities were observed in Kalibo Public Market. Moreover, lots of consumers were observed during the conducted price monitoring.																					
Consequently, in the market of Antique, abundant supplies were noted this week. For bangus and tilapia, the siad commodities were reportedly sourced from Pasayan, Hamtic, Antique, and Iloilo City. Nonetheless, market administrators were still implementing COVID 19 protocol (i.e., wearing of facemask).																					
Prices of fishery commodities in Guimaras were stable. In fact, abundant supply of fish and fishery products were noted in the market.																					
Lastly, at the market of Negros Occidental, prices of fishery commodities were stable this week.

There were few fish stalls open in the wet market in some Province of Zamboanga.</p> <p>R10 WEEK 1-October 31-November 4, 2022 - WEEK 5-November 28-December 2, 2022 No problem with regards to the movement of prices of fishery commodities. There were sufficient supply of fishery commodities in the major market. In fact, high supply of bangus, tilapia, and galunggong were noted this week. Demersal fishes were expensive as compared to pelagic fishes.</p> <p>R11 WEEK 1-October 31-November 4, 2022 Supplies of some fishery commodities were affected by the bad weather condition that brought strong winds and waves which hampered the fishing operations. Meanwhile, price of bangus remained steady this week which may be due to the sufficient availability of the said commodity for the consuming public. WEEK 2-November 7-11, 2022 As observed, adequate supplies of fishery commodities were noted among the monitored retail markets this week. The recorded total landed volume inside the wet market were reflected from the monitored fish stalls only. WEEK 3-November 14-18, 2022 Due to bad weather condition (strong winds and waves), supplies of marine fishery commodities were inadequate in the monitored markets. Nevertheless, high supply of bangus galunggong, hipon, tulingan, and tuna were noted. WEEK 4-November 21-25, 2022 As observed, the supply of fisheries commodities is high this week; hence, the price decreased. Additionally, imported pompano was available in the monitored retail markets after the market denial by the regional law enforcement team. Total landed volume inside the wet market from the monitored stalls. WEEK 5-November 28-December 2, 2022 As observed, supplies of fishery commodities were abundant, which resulted to slight decrease in price, especially for tilapia, galunggong, and hipon. On the other hand, other public wet markets have increased in price due to the minimal availability of fishery commodities caused by the inclement weather condition.</p> <p>R12 WEEK 1-October 31-November 4, 2022 General Santos City - Small volume of fishery commodities were unloaded in the market which could be due to Typhoon. Koronadal City - Small volume of fish due to bad weather but there were no changes in the price of displayed fishery commodities. Tacurong City - Despite the occurrence of Typhoon, sufficient supplies of fishery commodities were observed among the monitored wet markets this week. Glan - Supplies of fishery commodities were affected by the inclement weather condition. Kidapawan City - No significant changes were noted in the recorded prices of fishery commodities this week. However, no supplies of "Borot" were observed in Kidapawan City. WEEK 2-November 7-11, 2022 General Santos City - According to fish vendors small volume of fish in the market due to full moon. Koronadal City - There were no changes in price and supply of fishery commodities in the market. Tacurong City - There were no changes in price of some fishery commodities and still have sufficient supply of fish. Consequently, ample supplies of bangus, hito and tilapia were noted. Glan - According to some retailers there were shortage in some species of tuna but the other supply were sufficient. Kidapawan City - Prices of some marine fishery commodities fluctuates this week. Nevertheless, supplies of bangus and tilapia were stable in the market. WEEK 3-November 14-18, 2022 General Santos City - Volume of fish in the market was insufficient due to lesser unloaded fish in the fishport. Koronadal City - Price and supply of fishery commodities in the market were stable. Tacurong City - Fish supply in the market were stable. Glan - Supply and price were stable except shortage on tuna. Kidapawan City - The prices and stock of fishes in the market were stable except for matambaka. WEEK 4-November 21-25, 2022 General Santos City - Minimal supply of fish in the market due to higher price of fish from the fishport. Nonetheless, sufficient supply of bangus, tilapia and galunggong were observed this week. Koronadal City - Slight decrease in supply of fishery commodities but stable in prices. wever, the supply of fishery commodities is sufficient like bangus, tilapia and hito. Glan - No supply of tuna but the other commodities were stable (supply and price). Kidapawan City - Some fisheries commodities increase the price especially for bangus and pusit due to bad weather condition. WEEK 5-November 28-December 2, 2022 General Santos City - volume of fish in the market was insufficient due to lesser unloaded fish in the fishport. Koronadal City - price and supply of fishery commodities in the market were stable. Tacurong City - prices remained stable and there were sufficient supplies of hito, bangus and tilapia. Some of the provinces have lack of supply which may be due to the inclement weather condition. Prices could be affected depending on the quantity of supplies and quality (in terms of sizes and freshness).																													
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Minimal supplies were observed in the monitored retail markets this week. This might be due to the bad weather condition.

The following observations were gathered from market vendors and administrators for the month of November:																													
1. Generally, sufficient display of fresh marine commodities were recorded among the monitored retail markets this month. However, limited availability of the said commodities were noted on the first and second week of the month which might be attributed to the hampred fishing operations brought by the onslaught of Severe Tropical Storm "Paeng". Consequently, limited availability of local fresh galunggong lakali (Decapterus macrostoma) was recorded throughout the month alongside the implementation of Closed Fishing Season (CFS) of galunggong species in Northern Palawan.																													
2. Adequate supplies of imported-frozen galunggong lakali (Decapterus macrostoma) were recorded this month chiefly sourced from Navotas Fish Port. Presence of other imported-frozen commodities (i.e., pomfret, chub mackerel, Atlantic salmon, moonfish, and Indian scad) were also noted in the monitored retail markets this month.																													
3. For alumahan, limited display of medium-sized commodity was observed this month sourced mainly from Malabon Fish Port. Meanwhile, display of other variant (i.e., Hasa-hasa) was also noted.																													
4. Sufficient availability of aquaculture commodities (i.e., bangus and tilapia) were recorded throughout this month. On the other hand, minimal supplies of medium-sized bangus were noted which could possibly be due to the limited unloading's of the commodity wherein fish farmer might limit their harvest to attain maximum maturity of their stocks which will have better demand and pricing in the upcoming holiday season.																													
5. Top fishery commodities in the sixteen (18) monitored retail markets are sourced mainly from the following areas:																													
a. Bangus - Bulacan, Pangasinan																													
b. Tilapia - Batangas, Pampanga																													
c. Local Galunggong - Malabon Fish Port

6. Meanwhile, there continues to have low influx of buyers were observed among the monitored retail markets throughout the month. In connection, vendors were noted selling lower volume and variety of fishery commodities to ensure all displays will be sold by the end of the day to avoid losses. Further, as observed, some of the displayed fishery commodities were remaining stocks from previous market days.

Fluctuation in the prices of the top fifteen (15) and other commodities are influenced by a number of factors such as the commodity's size, quality, volumes of available supply, source area, as well as the weather condition and other natural phenomena.

Meanwhile, supplies with the highest prevailing price of Php 260.00/kg were recorded in Region 10 wherein the available supply were larger in size.																													
2. <i>Anodontia edentula</i> or Imbao (Php 140.00- & 250.00 /kg) - supplies with the lowest prevailing price of Php 140.00/kg were recorded in Region 10 wherein the said commodity were smaller in size. Meanwhile, supplies with the highest prevailing price of Php 250.00/kg were recorded in Region 11 wherein the available supply were larger in size.
