Remarks/Market Observations:		<ol> <li>Despite the occurence of Typhoon "Hanna" and Tropical Depression "Ineng", sufficient unloading of fresh marine commodities were still observed at Nave Fish Port. Commodities recorded were tulingan, chabeta, tambakol, dalagang bukid, hasa-hasa, and others. Consequently, supply of local fresh galunggong lalaki (<i>Decapterus macrosoma</i>) remained adequate at the fish port sourced from Zambales, Northern Palawan, and Quezon Province.</li> <li>Likewise, sufficient unloadings of imported-frozen galunggong lalaki was still noted at Navotas Fish Port this month. This may be attributed to the existin demand for the commodity wherein some vendors opted to purchased imported-frozen galunggong due to its uniform sizes and affordable price as compare with local-fresh galunggong. Also, imported-frozen galunggong babae continued to be available at the fish port this month.</li> <li>Minimal volume of supply of alumahan (<i>Rastrelliger kangurta</i>) was observed at the fish port this month. In fact, only in the first week have recorded with supply of the commodity at an actual price of Php280.00/kg chiefly obtained from Batangas.</li> <li>Sufficient unloading of bangus and tilapia were also recorded at the fish port. Nonetheless, higher wholesale prices were recorded this month. This might due to the following reasons:         <ul> <li>* Expensive aquaculture feeds and inputs;</li> <li>* Higher logistical cost brought by the increased in oil/fuel prices and among others;</li> <li>S.
